

Remember When: The M.A.S.H. Game

Played with just a pencil, paper and a friend or two, this fortune-telling game is a classic boredom buster for kids and teens. The name comes from the letters "M.A.S.H."-short for mansion, apartment, shack or house-written at the top of the page. A player then chooses a few more categories, such as "spouse," "job," "car" or "number of kids," and comes up with options for each. The wackier—like being married to a celebrity or having 100 kids—the better! Next, the player makes tally marks until another player yells "Stop!" This number is used to count through the categories and cross off options until only one option is left in each category. "M.A.S.H." was most popular in the 1980s and '90s, but historians have traced its origin to similar games, including "Tinker, Tailor," a fortune-telling nursery rhyme that was published in 1695.

Pump Up Your Heart IQ

Hearts, the universal symbol for love, are all around this month as businesses and consumers alike celebrate Valentine's Day. Get pumped up for the holiday with these fun facts!

- Romans, Egyptians and Greeks are among the ancient cultures who valued the human heart as a source of life and emotion.
- The familiar heart symbol is believed to have been inspired by plants, including the seeds of an ancient variety of fennel, as well as the leaves of water lilies and ivy.
- Until the 1400s, the heart symbol was usually portrayed upside-down, with the pointed end up.
- Early in the 16th century, Leonardo da Vinci drew the first known accurate sketch of the human heart.
- Most animals only have one heart, but octopuses, squids and cuttlefish have three. Some creatures, including jellyfish and starfish, don't have a heart at all!
- The heart of a blue whale, the biggest animal on the planet, weighs over 400 pounds. When the whale is underwater, its heart beats only two to 10 times a minute.
- In a standard playing card deck, the king of hearts is the only king without a mustache.
- From the smiley face with heart-eyes to heart shapes in every color of the rainbow, there are at least 39 emoji that feature a heart in some way.
- Invented by Richard Cadbury, the first heart-shaped boxes of chocolates were sold in 1861. Every year, people buy over 36 million of the sweet samplers for Valentine's Day.
